

# The Leaders Library Card Challenge Toolkit



## Hello Library Card Challenge Leaders!

This online toolkit is designed to provide you with the resources that can help you continue to strengthen your partnership with school leaders and city/county government officials to ensure all students in your jurisdiction have a library card and access to essential library learning resources. ### I. Background

The Leaders Library Card Challenge is a national effort to ensure that every child enrolled in school has access to the valuable learning resources available at public libraries. Launched in 2015 by President Obama as part of his ConnectED Initiative, the Library Challenge grew out of a belief that more intentional collaboration among chief elected officials, school superintendents and library directors could improve education outcomes for all students, begin to close achievement gaps and create a framework for an integrated approach to education.

Participation in the Challenge begins with a letter of commitment signed by the chief elected official, school superintendent and library director. Sixty communities participated in the President's call to action and collectively issued new library cards to more than one million school children in less than one year of work. Many of those cards were first-time virtual cards giving students instant 24-hour access to library resources using their student IDs.

Participating communities share ideas and resources and troubleshoot challenges through an online collaborative community on the Basecamp platform and participate in webinars led by ULC focusing on topics identified with input from the community teams. In January 2016, the White House hosted a one-day convening of participating mayors/county executives, library CEOs and school district superintendents and a call-to-action publication was released later that year.

# II. Continuing the Work: The Leaders Library Card Challenge

With such great partnerships established and incredible efforts to increase library access already underway, ULC and IMLS committed to continuing the work of the Library Challenge. A survey of libraries who participated in round one found that within 10 months of initiating the work:

- 75 percent had a new/expanded relationship with school leaders
- 53 percent had a new/expanded relationship with elected officials
- 43 percent had created a library-school Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
- 72 percent are now working with school and/or local government leaders in new ways, beyond distributing library cards
- 58 percent gained local media coverage about their collaborative work to improve education outcomes

Now called the Leaders Library Card Challenge, (LLCC) nearly 50 additional communities have signed on and are creating partnerships for round two of the initiative. Both the first and second cohort of participating communities are now sharing ideas and resources through the online collaborative community on the Basecamp platform and participating in regularly scheduled webinars hosted by ULC.
